All youth on probation, on the consent calendar or on deferred prosecution status will be expected to adhere to a policy of no use/consumption of illegal substances (tobacco, alcohol, or non-prescription drugs). This grant will help with the purchase and restocking of supplies which will enable the probation staff to complete regular drug testing for juveniles with substance abuse issues and to monitor their compliance with the Court's Zero Tolerance policy. The 26 th Judicial Circuit Court, Family Division, will also collaborate with Catholic Human Services. All youth will be subject to random checks for substance abuse. First time offenders for minor in possession of alcohol and illegal drug use will be referred to Catholic Services for a substance abuse education group session and/or Alcohol Highway Safety Class. Some first time offenders for substance abuse, or who commit offenses while under the influence of substances are referred for screening and follow up out-patient or in-patient treatment.

The 46th Circuit Trial Court encompassing Crawford and Otsego Counties use the JABG grant funding to pay the half of the salary for two caseworkers whose function is to monitor and enforce probationary compliance. There is a case service plan for each of the assigned youth that includes drug testing and other goals and objectives to encourage juvenile's adherence with society norms. Youth receive both positive and negative consequences in this process.

Youth on probation, who are under the jurisdiction of the court will be tested for unlawful use of controlled substances and alcohol. Those youth who continue to violate the law will receive graduated sanctions including detention. This multi-systemic approach will reduce youth crime as evidenced by the continued reductions in Grand Traverse County's petitions. Our Courts recognize that due to decreased funding this grant provides important funding for needed consistency in programming.

These youth referred by the Court have been charged with a	This grant continues to support the juvenile probation officers in Mason and Lake Counties with making youth accountable for their actions in regards to use of alcohol and drugs. Graduated sanctions help a youth understand that continued use of drugs or alcohol will result in tougher sanctions to the point that they may be removed from their home. The 51st Circuit Court substance abuse policy goal is to access, deter, treat and identify those youth using drugs or alcohol. Testing is done by the probation department with each court. Sanctions are established, as well as rewards for negative test. The program has given probation officers many tools to assist in their jobs. These include educational materials,

The youth can be on diversion, consent or formal calendar..	The 19th Judicial Circuit--Family Division will use a program of graduated sanctions, the drug court program, drug testing, intensive outpatient drug/alcohol treatment and intervention strategies to deter youth in Benzie and Manistee from using Drugs and Alcohol. Upon receiving a petition for a drug or alcohol offense the minor will be referred to Catholic Human Services to participate in a drug education program for teens. If the minor violates a condition of probation or if they test positive for alcohol/drugs they may be referred to Catholic Human Services for an in depth drug/alcohol assessment. Once the assessment is done, the treatment provider and caseworker will then make a recommendation to the court on treatment related issues necessary to assist the minor in changing inappropriate behaviors. The recommendation could be for the youth to attend intensive out-patient treatment, inpatient treatment, or refer the youth and family to drug court. The caseworker will refer to the proper program and provide all the necessary casework services to assist the youth toward the goal of zero tolerance. All the caseworkers are very knowledgeable about the programs available for youth in their respective communities and will work together with the schools, Department of Human Services, Mental Health, and local law enforcement to provide services to families and youth in Benzie and Manistee Counties. The substance abuse testing policy is very simple. A youth can be tested twenty-four hours per day, seven days per week, three hundred sixty-five days per year. We then send the urine samples to Redwood Toxicology for analysis. .

This grant supports the Drug Enforcement Monitors. It also pays for drug tests, PBT's, and immediate graduated responses for juvenile court youth who fail their drug or alcohol screens. This grant also supports in-home supervision and community work programs that are part of the court's balanced and restorative justice philosophy. The grant also helps support the court's Juvenile Incentive Program (our version of a drug court).

The Oceana County Family Court provides a comprehensive approach to working with rural youth struggling with substance abuse issues. The court works with a system of graduated sanctions and a full continuum of services. Programs include outpatient counseling, standard probation services, random drug testing, court support groups, and experiential and long term substance abuse programming. JABG-NM funds will provide experiential substance abuse programming through Youth Camp Programming and Random drug testing. Newaygo County Juvenile Division provides a comprehensive approach to youth substance abuse issues. Programs include diversion, probation, random drug testing, in-home detention, and placement.

			<p>These programs could include psychological testing, substance abuse counseling and treatment, and educational/support groups depending on the needs of the youth. JABG-NM funds allow the court to contract services to provide Diversion Programming to first time juvenile offenders. Diversion programs give youth the opportunity to avoid prosecution resulting in a criminal record. Diversion gives the youth a chance to recognize his/her poor choices, analyze decisions and modify behavior. Diversion programming provides the youth and their families' awareness training and education. The Drug and Alcohol Diversion program provides a challenge education experience at Camp Henry, group counseling, and random drug testing. The Tobacco Diversion Program utilizes a health educator from District #10 Health Department to provide education. The Shoplifting Diversion Program requires group meetings and a home study program with a verification quiz. All diversion groups require eight hours of community service from each participant as well as continued school attendance and good behavior. Criminal activity results in immediate discharge from the program.</p>

Court staff administer the Substance Abuse Subtle Screening Inventory (SASSI) and a plan for intervention services is designed. Services may include group counseling, drug/alcohol classes, individual therapy, random surveillance, mentoring, and weekly probation visits.</p>

The program's intent is to help the child become more successful at school, home and in the community and to prevent an out of home placement.</p>
