

## Insurance Assistance Program (IAP)/IAP-Plus

Affiliated with HIV/AIDS Advocacy Services, the Insurance Assistance Program pays health insurance premiums for people living with HIV/AIDS who have private health insurance and are currently too ill to work in their current job or if there is a substantial likelihood that he or she will be too ill to work within the next three months. IAP-Plus pays premiums for people living with HIV/AIDS who have private health insurance with prescription coverage.

# Connecting People in Need to Health & Financial Help, Now



**The Office of HIV/AIDS Advocacy Services** provides state and federal program eligibility and benefit information for people living with HIV/AIDS. The office may help clients and case managers:

- Make sense of what benefits are available.
- Determine if a client meets the state and federal eligibility requirements.
- Sort out the application procedures.

Through collaborations with other state agencies and non-governmental organizations, the office also provides many other services useful to people living with HIV/AIDS.

## Why is this service so important to those living with HIV/AIDS?

Today, with the availability of combination drug therapy, living with HIV/AIDS is like living with a chronic disease, but even with a reliable and well thought out health care plan there is always a risk of acute illness.

Such illness can mean losing one's job, developing drug resistance, and even death. Maintaining a functional health care plan is critical in avoiding such a situation as much as possible. A safety network that helps people living with HIV/AIDS get through times of financial crisis and will ensure that health services are not disrupted is a necessary part of this health care plan.

The state and federal government provide some services that minimize gaps in income and health care, creating a more stable network. Unfortunately, the available services are complicated and always changing. A person living with HIV/AIDS may not be able to afford the time and effort of maintaining up-to-date knowledge of available benefits, eligibility requirements, and application procedures before they experience a devastating health crisis.

Additionally, poverty, social barriers, and stigma may exacerbate these concerns.

It is the purpose of the Office of HIV/AIDS Advocacy Services to address these needs, improving the quality of life for people living with HIV/AIDS and making Michigan a better community.

## HIV/AIDS Advocacy Services Also Provides:

- **HIV/AIDS Benefit Information Summary:** General guidelines, in a quick and easy to reference format, on benefits, amounts, and eligibility criteria.
- **“User Friendly Manual”:** In partnership with Wayne State University, HIV/AIDS Advocacy Services maintains and distributes this comprehensive booklet of resources, information, and contacts useful to People living with HIV/AIDS.
- **Project HOPE:** A collaboration with Goodwill Industries, this program helps PLWHA re-enter the workforce.
- **“Ken’s Korner”:** A periodic newsletter that distributes useful information to HIV/AIDS service providers.
- **Trainings, Workshops & Presentations:** Offered for support groups, case managers, university classes, etc.
