

Michigan Patient Centered Medical Home (PCMH) Initiative Practice Transformation Collaborative Learning Session 1

April 3-4, 2017 · Lansing, MI

OVERVIEW

Learning Session 1 is the first of a series of face-to-face learning sessions planned for Michigan's PCMH Practice Transformation Collaborative and will focus on developing community clinical linkages, team development and building an infrastructure of quality improvement.

Over the two days, teams will work together to learn more about developing partnerships to optimize care for the community and meet the socioeconomic needs of the patient populations they serve. Specifically, how to:

- Assess patients' social determinants of health to better understand socioeconomic barriers using a brief screening tool with all attributed patients.
- Provide linkages to community-based organizations that support patient needs identified through brief screening, including tracking and monitoring the initiation, follow-up, and outcomes of referrals made.
- Periodically review the most common linkages made and the outcome of those linkages to determine the effectiveness of the clinical community partnerships and opportunities for process improvement and partnership expansion.

Change management, team building, quality improvement tools and other topics informed by the baseline assessment results will be included in the sessions. Learning Session 1 features topic experts, best practice examples from participating sites and opportunities for teams to network and learn from each other and work and plan together.
