About MMP

MMP is a surveillance system designed to learn more about the experiences and needs of people who are living with HIV. It is supported by several government agencies and conducted by state and local health departments, along with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

There are 23 project areas involved in MMP including: California; Chicago, IL; Delaware; Florida; Georgia; Houston, TX; Illinois; Indiana; Los Angeles, CA; **Michigan**; Mississippi; New Jersey; New York; New York City, NY; North Carolina; Oregon; Pennsylvania; Philadelphia, PA; Puerto Rico; San Francisco, CA; Texas; Virginia; and Washington.




All participants receive \$50 for agreeing to complete the survey and have their medical records reviewed.

All personal and health care information collected during the project is kept secure and confidential.

How the data is used

The data provides an opportunity, on a local and national level, to help inform policy decisions, resource allocation, and evaluation of prevention and treatment initiatives. Data driven evidence will be beneficial when advocating to reduce the gaps and barriers that exist in resources that are currently available for people living with HIV.





Dental services were found to be the largest unmet need for those living with HIV. The next biggest unmet need for this population was eye and vision care.
