Get Ahead of Lead: Use Certified Filters

MDHHS recommends using a certified lead-reducing drinking water filter for drinking water, cooking, rinsing foods, and mixing baby formula.



Free certified lead-reducing filters are available to households who:

Have a person under 19 or a pregnant person **enrolled in Medicaid.**

AND

Have or unsure if they have one of the following:



Lead or galvanized plumbing.



A lead service line carrying water from the street to the home.



Old faucets and fittings that were sold before 2014.
