LEGISLATIVE UPDATE - Sgt. Travis Fletcher, MSP SIGNED INTO LAW:

HB 4250 - 4252 - Hands-free Driving (Koleszar/Carter, T./Mueller) PA 39, 40, 41'2023

- Tie-barred together
- Would prohibit holding or using mobile electronic device
 - Exceptions for: law enforcement/etc.; emergency; GPS; hands-free voice-operated use; continuously recording or broadcasting video inside or outside the vehicle
- "Enhances" penalties; if a crash, LEO must indicate use on crash report*
- Allows for 90-day drivers license suspension after 3 or more violations in a 3-year period
- First offense: 0 pts / \$100 fine
- Second offense: 1 pt SOS abstract / \$250 fine
- Doubled fine if a crash

MDOT - Ms. Kim Zimmer reporting on behalf of Mr. Gregg Brunner

MDOT appreciated the invite to participate in the 08/01/2023 Safety Day at MSP headquarters. It was a great opportunity for us to showcase what we are doing in the area of safety plus bring along some of our equipment to better explain what we do on the roadways.

Both the Highway Safety Improvement Program (HISP) Implementation Plan and the HISP Annul Report have been submitted to FHWA. The Implementation Plan is in response to MDOT not meeting the annual Safety Targets for 2021. The Annual Report include the targets for 2024.

We are finishing our review of the final report for *Effective Pedestrian/Non-Motorized Crossing Enhancements Along Higher Speed Corridors* as done by Western Michigan University. We expect publication in the next couple months.

Evaluating the Performance and Safety Effectiveness of Roundabouts - an Update

Measure the Operational Cost and Benefit of Speed Feedback Signs

Friendly reminder to motorists regarding drivers moving over for emergency responders or crews working along the side of the roadway. Crews were out working the aftermath of the storm that did damage along I-96 in Williamston and people were not attempting to move over to give crews a safe space regardless of how close the equipment was to the roadway.

Road to Restoration is a free clinic to assist Michigan residents in understanding the steps to restore their driving privileges. Residents are strongly encouraged to register for the clinics in advance.

The MDOS is in the process of developing and testing with the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administration (AAMVA) for the implementing of the Driver History Program. The purpose of the project is to facilitate the movement of Commercial Driver License (CDL) Driver histories electronically so that states are better able to ensure accurate records for their citizens. This effort enables states to take proper, timely action to promote traffic safety. Key components are accurate data received from the roadside law enforcement, timely adjudication, and transmission of the conviction to the Department of Motor Vehicles for placement on the records and taking the appropriate sanction against the driver. Michigan is in the process of doing our structured testing with the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administration (AAMVA). As of September 5, we are over 50% completed with our testing and are on schedule for our October 16, 2023, implementation.

A contract to upgrade the testing kiosks in the branch offices was recently approved. This will better enable the recent legislation that will allow properly vetted individuals to take their operators written knowledge tests remotely and not have to come into the branch offices for this portion of their tests. The new technology will enable more languages to be used to help us serve our citizens more effectively. This will also reduce some of the wait times in the branch offices when there have been waiting times for various tests (operator, CDL, mechanic). Our technology partners are working to finalize the business requirements to allow us to move forward with the development, validation and placement of the new machines and the usage of the new technology.

As many of you know, in 2019, MDOS and OHSP had a grant with a contracted vendor, the University of Michigan Transportation Research Institute, to develop, implement and evaluate a Pilot Parental Involvement in Graduated Driver Licensing (GDL) program. The program consisted of a parent meeting to explain the importance of their role in GDL with the goal of reducing teen crashes and their associated fatalities and injuries. Unfortunately, the project was cancelled due to COVID after the materials were developed but before the meetings could be implemented. MDOS and OHSP have now contracted the same vendor to utilize the previously developed materials into a mandatory training for driver education providers, many of whom offer parent meetings like the one initially envisioned by the original project. MDOS and OHSP were able to provide feedback to UMTRI on the developed training and will be participating in a Train the Trainer meeting with UMTRI next week Tuesday, September 19. Upon completion of that meeting, MDOS staff will begin providing the training to driver education providers as part of their mandatory training.

The department will have a booth at the North American International Auto Show at Huntington Place in Detroit from September 16-24, 2023. MDOS staff will be available to answer questions and assist with transactions during the auto show. Our mobile office will be available for transactions, such as license and ID or tab renewals from noon-6 p.m. each day.

In July, in partnership with OHSP, MDOS developed and implemented a traffic safety educational message on the hands-free distracted driving law, which Ms. Mullin has graciously agreed to play for the commissioners at this meeting: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=1My_49HlsbY

Michigan Department of Education (MDE) - Mr. Troy Hansbarger

Received an email from Ms. Alicia Sledge regarding the Ford Driving Skills event taking place at MSP Academy in September 23-14, 2023, district and superintendents were routed the information so it can be shared forth with high school administration for student awareness.

Sgt. Matter and his team have started annual school bus inspections to start September 1, 2023. Preparing to be on-time with state funds to be dispersed to MSP which is set at \$1.8 million for the school year.

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FMCSA - Received a message from a training agency with details tied to a taskforce for the month of September and October to audit school busses and staff. Review seems to be focused on staff credentialing (CDLs) and applicability for the drug-and-alcohol clearing house.

In the Governor's latest bill, this will allow \$125 million dollars for clean energy bus grants throughout the state. Details are limited currently.

Michigan State Police (MSP) - Major Ryan Pennell

The MSP Third District Traffic Safety Enforcement Squad covers Midland, Saginaw, Flint, and Lapeer areas. For the month of August 2023, the team of seven traveled 18,000 miles patrolling highways and roadways in the third district with 23 motorists assist with 930 traffic stops with under 700 warnings.

Local Representative - Mr. William Miller

Last week, the Tri-County Summit for Macomb, Oakland, and Wayne County met. Charging stations and road funding were large areas of conversation.

Attended a recent event for construction agencies where discussion occurred around funding for families of road workers who are killed including college grants. If interested, Mr. Miller can help connect the GTSAC with this organization for a future presentation.

Invites the commissioner for a site visit to the Operator Engineers Training & Education Center located in Howell, Michigan.

Governor's Office - Mr. Steve Kiefer

29 states are now onboard with the hands-free legislation with Michigan following suite. Upcoming Cambridge Telematics presentation will help to show the importance on this lifesaving legislature.

Chair's Report / Office of Highway Safety Planning (OHSP) - Ms. Katie Bower

The OHSP submitted our Annual Grant Application submitted to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration requesting \$26.7 million dollars with approval to follow soon regarding the grant total award. We received a total number of 124 grant applications for fiscal year 2024 including a tribal agency and several equipment requests for emergency medical services.

Our Triennial Highway Safety Plan was morphed from an annual plan to a triennial plan. Michigan led by example with our detail of work and as a template for other states to follow format wise.

The Michigan Traffic Safety Summit is planned for March 12-13, 2024, at the Kellogg Center in East Lansing, Michigan. Accepting speaker and topic submissions until September 29, 2023.

PRESENTATIONS

Cambridge Mobile Telematics - Mr. Ryan McMahon - Cambridge Telematics Focuses from today's presentation:

- Overview of the company
- Data collection methodology
- Data analysis
- Application to road safety

Total of 96 programs over 25 countries with 25 million users in 18 languages.

Most of the data analyzed today are from Smartphone Telematics with the ability to pull information from the accelerometer, gyroscope, magnetometer, GPS, barometer, proximity sensor and ambient light. Distracted Driving is now analyzed in a variety of different content.

Partnering with highway safety offices to:

- Improve visibility on risk
- Analyze effectiveness of interventions
- Helping to prioritize infrastructure investments
- Lowering risk prevalence and improving roadway safety

2022 Data Update - Mr. Patrick Bowman - University of Michigan Transportation Research Institute (UMTRI)

Introduction for today's presentation:

- All data is official annual year-end data (with 2023 data received in Spring 2024)
- All data comes from the Criminal Justice Information Center, Michigan State Police Traffic Crash Database
- Ten years of data (2013-2022) most current available for year-end
- Data located on Michigan Traffic Crash Facts (MTCF): http://www.michigantrafficcrashfacts.org/

Key take-aways:

- In recent year (2021 and 2022), crash counts are still lower than prior to 2020.
- Fatality counts have increased since 2018, with a slight drop in 2022.
- Total injuries (suspected serious, suspected minor, possible) are trending downward.
- Injuries are similar to the overall crash pattern (up and down each year).
- Alcohol-involved crashed have generally decreased since 2017 (10-year high).
- Alcohol-involved fatalities have been increasing since 2019 (except for a drop in 2022).
- Drug-involved crashes have increased with a decrease in 2022.
- Drug-involved fatalities have increased.
- Speed-related crashed have decreased.
- Speed-related fatalities have increased in recent years.
- Motorcycle-involved crashed are more steady year to year than fatalities.
- Motorcyclist fatalities continue to increase.
- Unhelmeted motorcyclist fatalities continue to increase.
- Pedestrian fatalities have increased in recent years.
- Bicyclist fatalities have increased in recent years but tend to vary more year to year because counts are similar.

- Heavy truck/bus crashes were increasing prior to the pandemic, 2022 also shows this trend.
- School bus crashes have shown a reduction in recent years, partly due to the pandemic.
- In 2019, fatalities peaked for Michigan school bus-involved fatalities.
- Crashes in the Upper Peninsula (U.P.) vary from year to year as weather usually plays a part.
- Fatalities in the U.P. have increased slightly in recent years.
- Except for 2021, younger drivers in fatal crashes have decreased in recent years.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

GTSAC Executive Order No. 2002-6, section 10

The commission shall identify traffic safety challenges, and develop, promote, and implement strategies to address those challenges. Specifically, the commission shall:

- 1. Develop comprehensive solutions to traffic safety challenges through partnerships with all levels of government and the private sector.
- 2. Maximize and coordinate the use of existing financial resources, including federal highway safety planning funds administered by the OHSP.
- 3. Manage resources devoted to traffic safety research, ensure that research programs are effective, and identify additional needs for traffic safety research.
- 4. Develop and implement a communications plan that increases public awareness regarding traffic safety issues and the commission's activities addressing traffic safety issues.
- 5. Promote traffic safety education through programs developed in cooperation with the Michigan Department of Education.
- 6. Encourage the use of collaborative activities in addressing traffic safety issues by identifying and recognizing best practices used by traffic safety organizations in the state.
